COMMANDER'S MESSAGE

We've had several overt displays of our members involvement in Chapter activities. Our first and most successful was your participation in the Forget-Me-Not drives that we've had for the last five years. We've had members in front of and actively interacting with the public in several communities. As a consequence the Chapter has raised over \$50,000 and already given most of it back to "disabled wartime veterans, their widows, their orphans and their dependents".

Our second involvement has been with our adoption of the chronic psych ward patients in Building 2 at the Brockton VAMC. During our regular visits we've brought food, drink, canteen books, activities and more important we have brought interaction to patients who can usually benefit from communicating with others than their ward mates and attendants.

Our third display has been as a result of our individual activities as a Chapter member. There are quite a few Chapter jackets showing up on the streets. This is because the wearer has gotten involved in Chapter activities. Attendance at meetings. volunteering at CHAPTER functions at ceremonies, parades and VAMC affairs for example all go toward earning a Chapter jacket. This is in its third year of operation. The first year we purchased about a dozen jackets with the DAV logo on the back and Chapter specific embroidery on the front. The second year we had a few more members earning their jacket. This year we will be including issuing the Chapter jackets to some of our newer members from the former Middleboro Chapter 36 who have been actively supporting our CHAPTER activities.

Last year the Chapter began an Awards Program to further recognize CHAPTER activities. Almost all of our members have a DAV fore and aft cap. Most of our officers and many of the members have the semi-official uniform of navy blue blazer, grey pants, white shirt and blue DAV tie. In recognition of their service to the CHAPTER and our clients we began issuing Award Ribbons to be worn on either the cap or jacket. These ribbons are not to be confused with military awards; consequently, when worn on the jacket are worn on the right side rather than over the heart. However, they are a public display of our members actively working at our CHAPTER activities. Activities for another organization, even though it may be for the same audience (such as VAMC) does not count for a CHAPTER award.

As your Commander I feel every honored that you have been putting forth all this effort and time to serve our fellow wounded warriors and their families.

Chapter 57's Color Guard and Banner Carriers participated in the Veterans Day activities in both Taunton and Middleboro this year. The ceremonies were held on separate days and allowed the participation of many members in both places.

The Taunton Ceremonies began with a breakfast at 9:00am to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the Taunton Area Vietnam Veterans Association. This was a successful event for the TAVVA and included various speakers, including Mayor Charles Crowley of Taunton. At 11:00AM all veterans groups assembled on the Green at the WW I Doughboy Statue, where the remembrance ceremonies began. The groups moved in turn to the WW II Monument, Korean Monument, Vietnam Monument and to the Desert Storm Monument. At each place a different Veterans Organization conducted the ceremony.

The following day found our members in Middleboro for the Veterans Day Ceremonies. The assembly area was in the Town Hall Parking lot at 9:30AM. The parade began at 10:00AM with our Chapter 57 the first group in the parade. Three of our members were able to walk the entire route of the parade. They were Fernand Medeiros, Treasurer; Martin "Pete" Fox and our intrepid gregarious Greg Sullivan. The rest of the contingent was content to ride in the vehicles, generously provided by METRO FORD of Raynham. Following the Parade the members participated in the ceremonies at the Veteran's Memorial Park. AGAIN and AGAIN

Half the year has already gone by.!!! Since installation we've had parades, ceremonies, cookouts, holidays, dinners, meetings, wakes, funerals, operations and some of you have even had births. We've looked for old comrades, we've welcomed new comrades and we still have to keep on the ~o. It's time to start thinking of new elections.

This is a never ending cycle. Elections - no sooner than we elect officers, install them than it becomes time to consider whether we ought to replace them. Consider all of the things that have happened since you cast your ballot. Have the individuals that were elected measured up to your standards, needs and goals? Have they exceeded your hopes? Are they on an upgrade, improving as time goes by, or have they disappointed you by showing little signs of meeting the needs of the organization? Whatever-

You have only a few months, a few meetings, before nominations, elections and installation. Please give serious thought to your choice of officers for the next year. You want individuals who can meet your immediate needs running the Chapter and you want individuals who will be in a position in a year or two to take over from your immediate choices. There must be progression. You cannot keep the same individuals in the same spots for the rest of your life.

People get old, people get ill, some loose their drive, others loose interest. We have a number of offices that must be filled by election; commander, senor vice commander, junior vice commander, treasurer, chaplain and delegates for example. We have a number of positions that can be filled by election and/or appointment; adjutant, quartermaster, officer of the day, sergeant at arms, armorer, etc. Some of these positions functions are not even within the Chapter; for example, we have delegates to the Department Executive Committee and to the District 7 Council In these latter two offices the individuals may actively represent the chapter or do nothing except occupy space. You may never know which because they may be attending meetings that we aren't at. Of course, this also applies if you don't come to Chapter meetings.

Begin reviewing your goals for officers, consider if you're satisfied or maybe you can do a better job. Nominations for office will be coming up in March. You should be giving serious thought to who you want to run your Chapter. We need a few of our good people to come to the fore and really get involved!



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VA AID AND ATTENDANCE COMPENSATION

Elderly veterans who are in need of a care provider, but cannot pay for it, may be eligible for Aid and Attendance -- a little-known monthly pension benefit administered through the Department of Veteran Affairs. Wartime veterans and surviving spouses who have in-home care or who live in nursing homes and assistedliving facilities may be eligible for the benefit. To be eligible, a veteran must have served at least 90 days of active military service (one day of which must be during war time) and have an honorable discharge.

What are Aid and Attendance and Housebound benefits?

Aid and Attendance (**A&A**) is a benefit paid in **addition** to monthly pension. This benefit may not be paid without eligibility to pension. A veteran may be eligible for A&A when:

1. The veteran requires the aid of another person in order to perform personal functions required in everyday living, such as bathing, feeding, dressing, attending to the wants of nature, adjusting prosthetic devices, or protecting himself/herself from the hazards of his/her daily environment, **OR**,

2. The veteran is bedridden, in that his/her disability or disabilities requires that he/she remain in bed apart from any prescribed course of convalescence or treatment, **OR**,

3. The veteran is a patient in a nursing home due to mental or physical incapacity, **OR**,

4. The veteran is blind, or so nearly blind as to have corrected visual acuity of 5/200 or less, in both eyes, or concentric contraction of the visual field to 5 degrees or less.

Housebound is paid in addition to monthly pension. Like A&A, Housebound benefits may not be paid without eligibility to pension. A veteran may be eligible for Housebound benefits when:

1. The veteran has a single permanent disability evaluated as 100-percent disabling **AND**, due to such disability, he/she is permanently and substantially confined to his/her immediate premises, **OR**,

2. The veteran has a single permanent disability evaluated as 100-percent disabling **AND**, another disability, or disabilities, evaluated as 60 percent or more disabling. A veteran cannot receive both Aid and Attendance and Housebound benefits at the same time.

How to Apply for Aid and Attendance and Housebound:

1. You may apply for Aid and Attendance or Housebound benefits by writing to the <u>VA regional office having jurisdiction</u> of the claim. That would be the office where you filed a claim for pension benefits. If the regional office of jurisdiction is not known, you may file the request with any <u>VA regional office</u>.

2. You should **include copies of any evidence**, preferably a report from an attending physician validating the need for Aid and Attendance or Housebound type care.

3. The report should be in sufficient detail to determine whether there is disease or injury producing physical or mental impairment, loss of coordination, or conditions affecting the ability to dress and undress, to feed oneself, to attend to sanitary needs, and to keep oneself ordinarily clean and presentable.

In addition, it is necessary to determine whether the claimant is confined to the home or immediate premises. Whether the claim is for Aid and Attendance or Housebound, the **report should indicate how well the individual gets around**, where the individual goes, and what he or she is able to do during a typical day. VETERANS VISION EQUITY ACT

The U.S. House of Representatives passed The Dr. James Allen Veteran Vision Equity Act of 2007. The legislation allows veterans who receive disability compensation for impairment of vision in one eye to be eligible to receive additional compensation for impairment of vision in the eye that is not service-connected. Additional provisions in Bill Number <u>H.R. 797</u> include extending authorization of the veterans' work study program until 2010 and allowing the Department of Veterans Affairs to continue to furnish a government headstone or marker for the grave of certain veterans buried in private cemeteries. The bill must return to the Senate for concurrence.

Modifies the standard for awarding disability compensation to veterans for loss of vision to require payment of compensation for impairment of vision (currently, blindness) involving both eyes due to a service-connected and non service-connected disability. Defines such impairment as a visual acuity of 20/200 or less or of a peripheral field of 20 degrees or less. Requires the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to provide the Secretary of Health and Human Services with information for comparison with the National Directory of New Hires for income verification purposes with respect to individuals under age 65 in order to determine eligibility for certain veteran benefits and services.

Requires:

(1) independent verification of information so acquired prior to terminating, denying, or reducing a benefit or service; and

(2) the opportunity for an individual to contest negative findings. Extends, through June 30, 2009, VA authority to provide an educational allowance to persons performing qualifying work-study activities.

(3) Authorizes the Secretary, in lieu of furnishing a headstone or marker for the grave of certain individuals buried in a private cemetery, to furnish a bronze representation of the letter "V" to be attached to a headstone or marker furnished at private expense.

MANUFACTURER PRODUCT RECALL

Ford is recalling some 2008 Focus, Expedition, F250 and F350 vehicles for failing to comply with the requirements of Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standard No. 208, 'Occupant Crash Protection.' The driver air bag module may not have been properly assembled. This condition may prevent the driver air bag from properly deploying and reduce occupant protection in the event of a crash. Dealers will replace the driver air bag module. The recall began on November 20, 2007.

HIGHWAY FATALITIES

According to a preliminary report from the Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), 43,200 died on the nation's highways in 2005, up from 42,636 in 2004. Drive safely, respect others and use your seat belts

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<u>GOVERNMENT QUESTIONS CHARITABLE</u> <u>GROUPS FUNDRASING</u>

The Oversight and Government Reform Committee held a hearing to examine whether all the charitable groups raising money for the purpose of helping our nation's veterans are genuinely serving that need. Although a large number of charities are fulfilling their mission, serious questions have been raised about some groups.

In the opening statement, Senator Henry A. Waxman stated "...The Committee has learned that a disturbing number of groups are raising millions of dollars in the name of helping veterans but keeping most of the donations for themselves. Instead of using the money to provide financial assistance or help veterans obtain care, these groups and the professional fundraisers they employ blatantly line their own pockets.

Information provided to the Committee and covered by CBS NEWS was by testimony of The American Institute of Philanthropy (AIP) and Charitywatch.org a nonprofit charity watchdog. They ranked various veterans groups in fundraising and the amount of money actually spent on veterans. Of the twenty three groups there were five A or better. The majority were in the D and F range. The information is misleading. The DAV received a Grade of D on this AIP report. The DAV replied in a letter that can be seen on Page 6 of this newsletter. You can see Chapter 57's figures in the column to the right. Take a real look at what is done!
