Interview a claimant and you have to remain closed mouth, confidential, private about anything you hear. Further, if the claimant asks you what the status of his or her claim is - you aren't going to know and won't be able to provide any information. The job has tremendous satisfaction in knowing that you are helping someone resolve a personal problem. At the same time, the job has many downsides: knowing that you may be forced to tell someone that they have a tough row to hoe, that vou haven't any information for them nor can you get any information for them, that it may be months before they will hear anything and similar aspects of a claim. It's a fulfilling but frustrating assignment.

I've been extremely fortunate with the officers I've worked with and all the members that have helped me. But, there is one job that remains an ongoing problem, raising money.. We wanted our own home. We bought and own our own home. We have to finance its maintenance. How about a little help? Will you make a donation to our Administrative Fund? Allied to this is raising money for our less fortunate brothers and sisters - our Forget-Me-Not campaign. This will be starting up in the not too distant future.

"I am a part of our American Flag. I have flown over a home in the U.S.A. I can no longer fly. The Sun and Winds have caused me to become tattered and torn. Please carry me as a reminder you are not forgotten".

If you have 3X5 unserviceable flags with embroidered stars please bring them to the Chapter Headquarters at 5-7 Taunton Green. We will make them available to the Pease Greeters, for their program.

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PEOPLE ARE LIVING LONGER

Life Expectancy: Life expectancy is up and the death rate is down, according to recent data from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). From data collected in 2007, life expectancy for newborns reached a new high of 77.9, according to the latest mortality figures reported in Deaths: Preliminary Data for 2007. The figures are based on nearly 90% of all death certificates in the United States. The 2007 increase in life expectancy was the continuation of a long trend. Between 1997 and 2007, life expectancy increased by 1.4 years, from 76.5 years to 77.9 years. Other highlights of the report include: • The average 65-year-old senior can now expect to live another 19 years or so, to nearly age 84.

• Record high life expectancy was recorded for both males (75.3 years) and females (80.4 years) in 2007. While the gap between male and female life expectancy has narrowed since the peak of in 1979, the 5.1 year difference recorded in 2007 is the same as in 2006.

• For the first time, life expectancy for black males reached 70 years.

• The U.S. death rate fell for the eighth year in a row to an alltime low of 760.3 deaths per 100,000 population in 2007. This is 2.1% lower than the 2006 rate of 776.5 and about half of what it was 60 years ago in 1947.

• Heart disease and cancer, the two leading causes of death, accounted for nearly half (48.5 percent) of all deaths in 2007.

IF YOU WANT TO IMPROVE YOUR ODDS TO LIVE A LONGER LIFE....

Want to improve your longevity? In addition to getting exercise, regular medical checkups, and eating healthy food, researchers say that making time to travel and making new friends help to increase our longevity. Travel can increase longevity by helping people establish and maintain a healthy lifestyle, says Dr. David Lipschitz, director of the Center on Aging at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences. In a 10-year longevity study of people aged 70 and older, researchers at the Centre for Ageing Studies at Flinders University in Adelaide, Australia concluded: · Close relationships with children and relatives had little effect on longevity rates for older people during the 10-year study. · People with extensive networks of good friends and confidantes outlived those with the fewest friends by 22%. • The positive effects of friendships on longevity continued throughout the decade, regardless of other profound life changes such as the death of a spouse or other close family members. DID YOU KNOW! By Norm Willoughby

Where did the military hand salute originate?

Originally the hand salute was not a salute but when knights happened to cross paths they would raise the visor of their helmets in order to be identified. They raised the visor with their right hand, which was also a sign they held no weapon, while holding the reins of the horse with the left hand. This developed into the hand salute. Also the sword salute is a derivative of the ancient knights in which the knight would kiss the cross member of the sword before going into battle.

The following explanation of the origin of the hand salute is perhaps closest to the truth: It was a long-established military custom for juniors to remove their headgear in the presence of superiors. In the British Army as late as the American Revolution a soldier saluted by removing his hat. But with the advent of more cumbersome headgear in the 18th and 19th centuries, the act of removing one's hat was gradually converted into the simpler gesture of grasping the visor, and issuing a courteous salutation. From there it finally became conventionalized into something resembling our modern hand salute.

Some theories take the hand salute back to Roman times. However, the salute it seems was always done as a sign of respect by juniors of their superiors and no less a sign of respect by the superiors when directed at their juniors. It in fact is a sign of mutual respect.

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WEARING OF MEDALS Military medals seem to come in two species, There are Department of Defense (DOD) authorized medals, that are listed in a persons military record, specifically the DD-214 form. These medals way be worn by the person to whom they were awarded. These medals are to be worn in the prescribed manner in order of precedence on the left chest of the uniform.

The second type of medals are known as Commemorative Medals. These are not approved by the DOD or listed on one's DD-214. These can be purchased through several outlets and serve to commemorate a person's service. These should only reflect what the person actually did and one should not buy these that reflect other things not done. These are not authorized for wear on any military uniform. The may be displayed by an individual if worn on the right side of the cap.

The wearing of any medal on a military uniform that was not authorized is a crime and amounts to STOLEN VALOR. Wearing unauthorized medals on the left chest of the DAV uniform amounts to STOLEN VALOR. Do not engage in this type of behavior.

If you don't have a Purple Heart or other medal for gallantry consider yourself lucky that you didn't have to go through what those that do have them had to endure. God bless them.

The Chapter issues the award ribbons for participation in Chapter activities. These ribbons are worn on the right chest and/or on the right side of the Uniform Cap. Enough said!
