You can apply by filling out VA Form 21-526, Veterans Application for Compensation and/or Pension. The VA recommends that if you have any of the following material, please attach it to your application:

- DD214 or equivalent)
- -Dependency records (marriage & birth certs)
  -Medical evidence (doctor & hospital reports)

### **CHAPTER 57 ANNUAL COOKOUT**



### New Procedures for Claims Based on Herbicide Exposure in Thailand and Korea

Effective immediately, when regional offices (ROs) receive disability claims based on exposure to tactical herbicides, such as Agent Orange, from Veterans who served in Thailand or Korea **during the Vietnam era**, there is no longer a requirement to send an inquiry to the C&P Service

Agent Orange Mailbox. Development inquiries can be sent directly to the Army and Joint Services Records Research Center (JSRRC) when the available evidence does not indicate tactical herbicide exposure. This will reduce processing time and provide better service to Veterans.

Herbicide related claims from Veterans with Thailand service After reviewing documents related to herbicide use in Vietnam and Thailand, C&P Service has determined that there was significant use of herbicides on the fenced in perimeters of military bases in Thailand intended to eliminate vegetation and ground cover for base security purposes.

Evidence of this can be found in a declassified Vietnam era Department of Defense (DOD) document titled Project CHECO Southeast Asia Report: Base Defense in Thailand. Therefore, when herbicide related claims from Veterans with Thailand service are received, RO personnel should now evaluate the treatment and personnel records to determine whether the Veteran's service activities involved duty on or near the perimeter of the military base where the Veteran was stationed.

### MEDAL of HONOR

The Medal of Honor is the highest military decoration awarded by the United States government. It is bestowed on members of the United States armed forces who distinguish themselves "conspicuously by gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty while engaged in an action against an enemy of the United States." Due to the nature of its criteria, it is often awarded posthumously.

Members of all branches of the U.S. military are eligible to receive the medal, and each service has a unique design with the exception of the Marine Corps and Coast Guard, which both use the Navy's medal. The Medal of Honor is often presented personally to the recipient or, in the case of posthumous awards, to next of kin, by the President of the United States. Due to its honored status, the medal is afforded special protection under U.S. law.

As the award citation includes the phrase "in the name of Congress", it is sometimes erroneously called the Congressional Medal of Honor, however the official title is the Medal of Honor.

There are two distinct protocols for awarding the Medal of Honor. The first and most common is nomination by a service member in the chain of command, followed by approval at each level of command. The other method is nomination by a member of Congress (generally at the request of a constituent) and approval by a special act of Congress. In either case, the Medal of Honor is presented by the President on behalf of the Congress.

The Medal of Honor confers special privileges on its recipients.

- His or her name entered on the Medal of Honor Roll.
- Entitled to receive a special pension.
- Enlisted recipients are entitled to a uniform allowance.
- Special entitlements to air transportation
- Special identification cards and exchange privileges.
- Eligibility for interment at Arlington National Cemetery.
- Their children eligible to attend the United States military academies.
- A Medal of Honor Flag.

### AFGHANISTAN AND IRAQ VETS VA ADMITS BURN PIT AILMENTS ARE REAL

A VA training letter is being distributed to VA regional offices to be used to determine military benefits for veterans. It represents a reverse on the denial by the military that returning veterans' health problems are linked to burn pit smoke in Iraq and Afghanistan. Burn pits, overseen by military contractors, are used to incinerate all waste at various bases including metals, food, medical, chemical, pesticides, paints and plastics, which are doused with jet fuel and set ablaze. Personnel at the various bases were exposed daily to toxic smoke and fumes. Returning veterans are reporting neurological and respiratory problems as well as cancers and blaming their ills on the burn pits. This Precedent Setting letter is the first time the VA has addressed potential battlefield exposures while the troops remained in the combat zone, as well as the first time VA sent out guidance about a potential war-related health issue without a congressional mandate or a recommendation from a large health organization. The letter, titled, "Environmental Hazards in Iraq, Afghanistan, and Other Military Installations," was sent to all VA regional offices. "Service members can be exposed to environmental hazards in the course of their military duties, which may result in adverse health effects," the letter states. "Numerous environmental hazards in Iraq, Afghanistan and other military installations that could potentially present health risks to service members and veterans have been identified." The letter says dioxins, volatile organic compounds and polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons have all be found in the burn pit smoke and particulate matter.

In Balad, one of the largest bases in Iraq which reportedly burns two tons of material a day, the open pits have been replaced with three incinerators.

### The following information about burn pit ailments was cut from another source:

The military suspects that exposure to burn-pit smoke combined with other factors -- such as smoking, proximity to the pit, certain genetic factors or pre-existing conditions could lead to longer-term effects. Certain individuals may be more susceptible because of genetics and pre-existing health conditions. Service members have complained of symptoms ranging from chronic bronchitis, asthma, sleep apnea, chronic coughs and allergy-like symptoms to more severe issues including heart problems, lymphoma and leukemia.

### New Option for Marking Veterans' Graves in <u>Private Cemeteries</u>

The Department of Veterans Affairs is offering bronze medallions to attach to existing, privately purchased headstones or markers, signifying a deceased's status as a Veteran. "For Veterans not buried in a national or state Veterans cemetery, or those without a government grave marker, VA is pleased to offer this option that highlights their service and sacrifices for our country,"


The new item can be furnished instead of a traditional government headstone or marker for Veterans whose death occurred on or after Nov. 1, 1990, and whose grave in a private cemetery is marked with a privately purchased headstone or marker.

The medallion is available in three sizes: 5 inches, 3 inches and 1½ inches in width. Each bronze medallion features the image of a folded burial flag adorned with laurels and is inscribed with the word "Veteran" at the top and the branch of service at the bottom.

Next of kin will receive the medallion, along with a kit that will allow the family or the staff of a private cemetery to affix the medallion to a headstone, grave marker, mausoleum or columbarium niche cover.

### WHY WE NEED THE "STOLEN VALOR" ACT

Per DOD records, from 1955 through 1975 about 2.8 million men and women served in Vietnam or in the waters off of Vietnam.

In 1995 The American War Library, through a special grant from the DOD, conducted a nationwide survey to determine the number of Americans who claimed to have served either incountry or on a U.S. Navy vessel in Vietnamese waters. The number of respondents totaled 9,815,361. This number was more than three times the number reported by DOD. This survey prompted President Clinton to declassify all WW2, Korea and Vietnam War era intelligence and personnel data so that such claims could be verified or refuted. This in depth study prompted the DOD to increase the number of those who served in Vietnam to slightly over three million men and women.

In 2005, in another DOD approved survey performed by the American War Library, the total number of Americans claiming to be eligible or possessing authorization of the United States Vietnam War Service Medal was 13,695,088; 11,104,005 of Americans claimed to have served in Vietnam (In-Country/In-Waters), and 2,591,083 Americans claimed to have served aboard a U.S. naval vessel in Vietnamese waters.

Largely as a result of this survey, the Stolen Valor Act was passed into law in December, 2005


Also as a result of the American War Library's report to DOD, along with supporting evidence from other reporting agencies or entities, in January 2007, president George W. Bush issued an Executive Order (signed into law, Jan 2007) making it a federal felony for any person to falsely claim, either verbally or textually, to be the recipient of a United States military decoration (medal) or service.

Editors note: I wonder if all of those politicians who've been falsely claiming to be Vietnam Vets will be prosecuted – for some reason I doubt it.

# VIETNAM VETERANS LIFE EXPECTANCY THIS AIN'T GOOD!

In 2008, the American War Library estimated there were about 980,000 surviving Vietnam Veterans; 903,240 will survive by 01 Jan 2010; but, it's estimated that by 01 Jan 2015 the surviving total of Vietnam War veterans will number fewer than 131,000 due to age complicated by accelerated physiologies resulting from herbicide, along with added post-military financial and other stress related factions due to declining economic and environment factors that are projected by other federal agency's that determine their impact on human life expectancy.

### COLA WATCH: VETERANS' COLA FOR 2011 IS TRACKING AT ZERO

Latest figures indicate there will be no COLA next year for disabled veterans and Social Security recipients.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics announced the May CPI-W of 214.1 which is an increase of 0.1% from the March CPI-W of 213.9. The May CPI-W of 214.1 is now down .6% from the 2008 COLA base of 215.5. The 2008 COLA base will be used to calculate the 2010 COLA since there was no 2009 COLA as a result of negative inflation from the third quarter of 2008 to the third quarter of 2009.

### **VA HANDBOOK**

The latest edition of the Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents Pamphlet can be obtained from the Department of Veterans Affairs online or by mail. It updates the rates for certain federal payments and outlines a variety of programs and benefits for American veterans. Most of the nation's 25 million veterans qualify for some VA benefits, which range from health care to burial in a national cemetery. Veterans may also be eligible for programs providing home loan guaranties, educational assistance, training and vocational rehabilitation, income assistance pensions, life insurance and compensation for service-connected illnesses or disabilities. In some cases, survivors of veterans may also be entitled to benefits. It describes programs for veterans with specific service experiences, such as prisoners of war or those concerned about environmental exposures in Vietnam or in the Gulf War, as well as special benefits for veterans with severe disabilities. It also provides an overview of programs and services for veterans provided by other federal agencies. It also includes resources to help veterans access their benefits, with a listing of phone numbers, websites, and a directory of VA facilities throughout the country. It can be downloaded at no cost from VA's Web site.

### **VOLUNTEERRING IS A HEALTHY ACTIVITY**

Most developed countries in the world have accepted the chronological age of 65 years as a definition of 'elderly' or older person. The elderly can be factored into two groups – healthy and frail.

A UCLA study found that older people who volunteer regularly tend not to become frail.

Frailty is a geriatric condition marked by weight loss, low energy and strength, and low physical activity. UCLA researchers followed 1,072 healthy adults aged 70 to 79 to determine if productive activities -- specifically volunteering, paid work and child care -- prevent the onset of frailty. The study suggests that participating in volunteer activities may prevent frailty in older adults.

The DAV is always looking for volunteers for various activities such as participating in our Honor Guard, helping others file for VA disabilities, visiting the "lock-ins" at the VA every month for a pizza party, participating in community activities such as parades and a host of other activities.
