As I've aged, I must have matured - or maybe the WWII and Korean vets mellowed – or more likely a combination of the two. We now accept each other - that barrier that separated us no longer exists – and now the torch is being passed from the WWII and Korean Vets to we Vietnam and Vietnam era Vets.





VA Sponsors New Scholarship for the Children of **Fallen Service Members**

Sergeant Benefit Honors Gunnery John David Fry The children of military personnel who died in the line of duty since Sept. 11, 2001 can apply for an educational scholarship similar to the new Post-9/11 GI Bill. Benefits are retroactive to Aug. 1, 2009. The scholarship, which is administered by the Department of Veterans Affairs, are named after Marine Gunnery Sergeant John David Fry, 28, a Texas native who died in Iraq in 2006 while disarming an explosive. He was survived by three young children. VA will begin paying benefits under the Fry scholarships on Aug. 1, 2010. Eligible participants may receive benefits retroactively to August 1, 2009, the same day the Post-9/11 GI Bill took effect. Eligible children may be married. Recipients are entitled to 36 months of benefits at the 100 percent level.

FSGLI Reduces Premiums

Military personnel insuring their families under the Service members' Group Life Insurance (SGLI) program, which is administered by the Department of Veterans Affairs, will have out-of-pocket expenses beginning "VA hopes these reductions will allow more military personnel to obtain affordable life insurance coverage for their spouses, particularly in these difficult economic times,". "Without insurance protection, life after the loss of a spouse can be not only challenging emotionally, but can place a severe financial strain on a family." rates will be reduced for all age groups by an average of 8 %.

THE PURPLE HEART

The Purple Heart is the oldest military medal in the world in present use. General George Washington initially designed and created it on August 7, 1782 as the Badge of Military Merit in response to an order from the Continental Congress to cease recognizing a soldier's outstanding valor or merit by an advancement of rank or granting of a commission due to a lack of funds. During preparation for Washington's bicentennial in 1932, the General Order for August 7, 1782 creating the Badge of Merit was rediscovered after 150 years of being lost. The medal was redesigned as a purple heart, with a bust of Washington in its center, and Washington's coat-of-arms on top. With the new design it was renamed the Purple Heart.

Criteria for Award of the Purple Heart:

The Purple Heart is awarded in the name of the President of the United States to any member of an Armed Force who, while serving with the U.S. Armed Services after April 5, 1917, has been wounded or killed, or who has died or may hereafter die after being wounded.

- In any action against an enemy of the United States;
- In any action with an opposing armed force of a foreign country in which the Armed Forces of the United States are or have been engaged;
- While serving with friendly foreign forces engaged in an armed conflict against an opposing armed force in which the United States is not a belligerent party;
- As a result of an act of any enemy of opposing armed forces;
- As the result of an act of any hostile foreign force;
- Family SGLI (FSGLI) monthly premium After March 28, 1973, as a result of an international terrorist attack against the United States or a foreign nation friendly to the United States.
 - serving outside the territory of the United States as part of a peacekeeping force.





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Caregivers and Veterans Omnibus Health Services Act Becomes Law

President Obama signed historic legislation (S. 1963) yesterday that provides comprehensive support to caregivers of severely disabled veterans, a central plank of DAV's Stand Up For Veterans platform. The legislation finally reached the President's desk after more than two years of discussion, debate and negotiations, resulting in substantial new benefits for caregivers, including stipends for thousands of financially strapped family members.

As it stands, the benefits of the new act apply primarily, though not exclusively, to veterans and caregivers of veterans of the Iraq and Afghanistan wars. the act also requires the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) "...to provide hospital care, medical services, and nursing home care for certain Vietnam-era veterans exposed to herbicide, and Gulf-War era veterans who have insufficient medical evidence to establish a service-connected disability" but contains little else specific to veterans of the pre-9/11 era other than to direct the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to "...submit a one-time report on the feasibility and advisability of expanding the program to cover veterans who have a serious injury incurred or aggravated before September 11, 2001."

The new Law Also Boosts Women Veterans Health Care Programs will boost women veterans health care programs for the nation's 1.8 million women veterans. DAV worked closely with Senator Patty Murray (WA) and Congresswomen Stephanie Herseth Sandlin (SD) while drafting the legislation to address many of the obstacles women face when seeking health care at VA medical facilities. As enacted, VA will for the first time cover the costs for up to seven days of post-natal care for newborn infants of women veterans receiving maternity services at VA facilities.

COURAGEOUS RESTRAINT WHAT DO YOU THINK?

In the war in Afghanistan, making sure you kill the enemy and no one else can take a ton of discipline and even courage. General Stanley McChrystal, who is the commander in Afghanistan, calls this discipline, "Courageous Restraint." It means even if someone on the ground is in trouble, you have to make sure you know what your target is and that you do your best not to hurt innocent civilians.

Sometimes not firing can be tough. Pilots say it's hard to watch their fellow soldiers on the ground taking fire. "We have to use restraint when it's tough," Col. Jack Briggs said. "We're listening to these kids on the ground, and they're taking fire."

Editors Note: Maybe I'm wrong, but if it comes down to it, I'm on the soldiers side. It's easy for the rear echelon brass to push "courageous restraint" when it's not their lives on the line.
