CHAPTER 57 HAS FIRST OPEN HOUSE IN NEW QUARTERS

Chapter 57 held its first ever “Open House” on 3 October 2009. The occasion was to allow the public to view the interior of the Chapter's first real home in our seventy-five year history. The month of October was chosen because the Chapter was formed in October of 1934. The original members were a group of “Veterans of The World War”, as it reads on the original banner of the Chapter. Of course, it refers to World War I. Little did those founding members realize that there was to be a second World War in a short seven years from their celebration that established this Chapter. This original banner hangs in the meeting room.

The Chapter was named after Corporal William F. Reardon. (More on Corporal Reardon on page 3). From its founding the Chapter has devoted itself to serving Disabled American Veterans, their spouses, widows and dependant children. The mission has not changed in the past seventy-five years and remains as our primary mission today. We are, indeed, proud of this tradition of service by those that have preceded us in this work of veterans helping veterans. The mission was one of the driving forces to purchase our own quarters.

We feel that having our own place allows us to have the resources at hand to better serve the needs of Disabled Veterans and their families. Department Adjutant Dan Stack stated at our Dedication Ceremony in June, that “This Chapter and this building are devoted to SERVING our Country's Disabled Veterans.



**WHO WAS
CORPORAL WILLIAM F. REARDON?**

The Chapter was named after Corporal William F. Reardon. He was a World War I veteran of the U. S. Army Balloon Corps. He saw action in France during that war. His job entailed being sent aloft in a basket suspended from a tethered balloon and becoming a target of enemy small arms fire and enemy aircraft. He reported on enemy activity in his sector.

Corporal Reardon returned to Taunton after the war and became an involved citizen. In addition to his work he joined the Veterans of Foreign Wars, David F. Adams Post. He became the (Veteran's) Graves Registration Officer for the City of Taunton.

The now Mr. Reardon began helping veterans that were disabled, as a result of their service in the military. He not only collected funds for the care of these veterans, but contributed money of his own.

He did not contribute just a little of his time and money to the disabled cause. Mr. Reardon his work was like a new vocation. He worked tirelessly to help his brother veterans that were less fortunate than he.

Now, as you may realize the U. S. Veterans Administration Did not come into being until 1934. Mr. Reardon was working with the disabled veterans before the Federal Government got involved.

The year 1934 saw the establishment of Chapter 57 of the Disabled American Veterans in the City of Taunton. This was a happy event. On a sad note was the fact that Corporal Reardon died on 9 June 1934, four months before the Chapter 57 Charter was given to the Taunton DAV

(Con't) For claim assistance the Chapter has Service Officers. They are trained and recertified annually. They help claimants through the myriad of paper-work that is necessary for the claims process.

There were many guest and members that dropped in to say hello, during the hours of the Open House. The family of deceased member Robert Doherty was in attendance. The "Front Office" was named for their father. It has become known as Bob's Office. It is in this room where claimants meet with our Service Officers. The space contains personal items of Bob's, including his desk, chair, medals, hat, canes and pictures. The space is not a museum to Bob but a tribute to a person that did so much for his fellow disabled veterans. It is a real working office and contributes to helping "Build Better Lives For America's Disabled Veterans.

The Family on this visit brought a Robert Taylor print. It is titled JG-52. The print pictured below is signed by several WW II German Luftwaffe pilots at least one of whom became a friend of Bob's after the war.. It is of four Messerschmitt BF-109 in flight.



The event was also well attended by local dignitaries. These included; City of Taunton Mayor Charles Crowley, City Councilors Sherry Costa-Hanlon, David Pottier and TMLP Commissioner and School Committeeman Peter Corr. It should be noted that these individuals and the City of Taunton has been very supportive in our efforts to help Disabled Veterans from the entire area of Southeastern Massachusetts.

We look toward having Open Houses periodically in order that more veterans are aware of our activities and programs.

MEDICATION SCAM

The **Department of Veterans Affairs (VA)** is warning Veterans not to give credit card numbers over the phone to callers claiming to update VA prescription information. Veteran Service Organizations have brought to VA's attention that callers are misrepresenting the VA to gain personal information over the phone. They say VA recently changed procedures for dispensing prescriptions and ask for the Veteran's credit card number. Veterans with questions about VA services should contact the nearest VA medical center or call, toll-free, 1-877-222-8387.

DAV'S 'STAND UP FOR VETERANS INITIATIVE RECEIVES TOP HONORS

The DAV's Stand Up for Veterans initiative, which recently contributed to a major victory in funding reform for veteran's health care, was honored Tuesday with the prestigious PR News Nonprofit Award for Public Affairs/Issues Management.

At an awards ceremony held in Washington, D.C., this grassroots advocacy program was recognized for its success in generating public awareness and support for wide-ranging veteran's issues. Among those accomplishments was enactment of the Veterans Health Care Budget Reform and Transparency Act (P.L. 111-81), historic legislation that President Obama signed into law in October.

Through Stand Up for Veterans, the DAV harnessed and employed powerful communications vehicles to help achieve what had been a top priority of veterans for more than a decade. The DAV also succeeded in creating greater awareness and support for legislation that has been introduced in Congress that will help meet the health care needs of disabled veterans and provide financial support and other services for their family

PRESIDENT SIGNS VA HEALTH CARE BILL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22—The Disabled American Veterans (DAV) today applauds President Obama for signing the Veterans Health Care Budget Reform and Transparency Act, calling it “the most significant legislative victory for veterans in a generation.”

“This is a great, historic day for all veterans and their families,” said DAV National Commander Roberto “Bobby” Barrera, who was at the signing ceremony in the White House. “Veterans, families, survivors and everyone else who cares about the plight of veterans can rejoice knowing that for the first time ever, the Department of Veterans Affairs’ health care system can be assured it will be funded on time and adequately every year.”

“We have worked for this for more than two decades as veterans suffered. Approval of advance appropriations is the most significant legislative victory for veterans in a generation,” he said. “This legislation will help ensure timely access to medical care for the men and women who have served, are serving and will serve in defense of our nation.”

“This long overdue legislation will make a difference for every disabled veteran and every future disabled veteran,” said Commander Barrera. “This victory flows from the effective collaboration by veterans organizations in the Partnership for Veterans Health Care Budget Reform, The Military Coalition and a dedicated group of former VA officials who joined our cause. Most important, this is happening because veterans across the country, including so many DAV members and supporters, stepped up and called on Congress to put an end to chronic funding lapses occurring for decades. Together, we stood up for veterans, and veterans and their families are going to benefit.”

“This historic legislation will ensure an uninterrupted, predictable flow of funds for veterans health care programs even if Congress is unable to complete work on the rest of the federal budget by the start of a fiscal year,” said DAV National Adjutant Arthur H. Wilson. “With funding assured, VA hospital and clinic directors will no longer have to delay the hiring of new doctors or nurses, or the purchase of new medical equipment, due to Congress’ failure to approve a budget on time; something that has occurred in 20 of the past 23 years, including this year. With advance appropriations in place, VA officials will be able to plan ahead how best to provide veterans with the medical care they have earned: when and where they need it.”


The Veterans Health Care Budget Reform and Transparency Act authorizes Congress to approve veterans medical care funding one year in advance to better meet the anticipated demand for veterans health care services. The advanced funding will give the Department of Veterans Affairs up to a full year to plan for the most effective and efficient way of delivering medical care. Additionally, this now requires the Government Accountability Office to audit the budget development process to ensure that sufficient funds are included.

The 1.2 million-member Disabled American Veterans, a non-profit organization founded in 1920 and chartered by the U.S. Congress in 1932, represents this nation’s disabled veterans. It is dedicated to a single purpose: building better lives for our nation’s disabled veterans and their families. More information is available at www.dav.org.

**THE DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS
EXPANDS SUICIDE PREVENTION SERVICES**

On July 3, 2009, the Department of Veterans Affairs launched a pilot on-line Chat Service, in partnership with Lifeline. The Veterans Chat Service is located at the VA National Suicide Prevention Hotline.

Veterans Chat enables Veterans, their families and friends to go online where they can anonymously chat with a trained VA counselor. If the chats are determined to be a crisis, the counselor can take immediate steps to transfer the chatter to the VA Suicide Prevention Hotline, where further counseling and referral services are provided and crisis intervention steps can be taken.

The online feature is intended to reach out to all Veterans who may or may not be enrolled in the VA health care system and provide them with online access to the Suicide Prevention Lifeline and provides Veterans with an anonymous way to access VA's suicide prevention services.

Veterans (and family members or friends) can access Veterans Chat through the Lifeline suicide prevention website. Watch for these key suicide warning signs, and provide the Lifeline number to anyone exhibiting them.

- Talking about wanting to hurt or kill oneself
- Trying to get pills, guns, or other ways to harm oneself
- Talking or writing about death, dying or suicide
- Hopelessness
- Rage, uncontrolled anger, seeking revenge
- Acting in a reckless or risky way
- Feeling trapped, like there is no way out
- Saying or feeling there's no reason for living.

The information below can be cut out and carried in the wallet if you are having problems or exhibiting any symptoms or thinking of hurting yourself. Remember people care!

**VA WORKING ON PLAN TO END
HOMELESSNESS AMONG VETERANS**

Secretary of Veterans Affairs Erik K. Shinseki Details Plan to End Homelessness for Veterans

This week, at the "VA National Summit Ending Homelessness among Veterans" Secretary of Veterans Affairs Eric K. Shinseki unveiled the department's comprehensive plan to end homelessness among Veterans by marshalling the resources of government, business and the private sector.

Shinseki's plan includes preventive measures like discharge planning for incarcerated Veterans re-entering society, supportive services for low-income Veterans and their families and a national referral center to link Veterans to local service providers. Additionally, the plan calls for expanded efforts for education, jobs, health care and housing.

INDIGENT VETERANS ASSISTANCE

Under Chapter 115 of Massachusetts General Laws (M.G.L. ch. 115), the Commonwealth provides a uniform program of financial and medical assistance for indigent veterans and their dependents. Qualifying veterans and their dependents receive necessary financial assistance for food, shelter, clothing, housing supplies, and medical care in accordance with a formula which takes into account the number of dependants and income from all sources.
