
# 2008 FORGET-ME-NOT DRIVE RESULTS



Chapter 57 recently went back to grammar school! Taunton's Our Lady of Lourdes asked Assistant Chaplain Dan O'Connor to do a short program on Veterans Day. Dan in his inimical style passed the word up to Commander Morin; who recruited Quartermaster Norm Willoughby to help out.

Upon arriving at the school and meeting Dr. Lincoln DeMoura, the Principal, we were given our talk parameters. The youngsters, from kindergarten to fifth grade were marched in and seated on the gym floor. Opening ceremonies, similar to our own meetings, were held. Honors to the Colors, a short prayer, and an introduction of the DAV were quickly undertaken.

At that point the Commander was up on deck. He spoke for a few minutes about the history of Armistice Day/Veterans Day and the National Moment of Remembrance. When asked how they became disabled both Dan and Norm did not discuss the topic in length, as happens with many veterans. Agent Orange was mentioned in passing.

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#### **FACT SHEET FOR VETERANS DAY 2008**

Massachusetts Veterans Statistics (September 30, 2008)

Approximately 441,000 veterans currently live in Massachusetts. The women veterans' population in Massachusetts is nearly 28,000.

1 in every 3 single homeless individuals in the Commonwealth is a veteran.

Massachusetts has suffered 108 casualties since the September 11, 2001 related to the Global War on Terrorism (GWOT). This number included non-combat related deaths.

541 military service members from Massachusetts have been wounded in action while fighting in the GWOT.

Approximately 29,000 Massachusetts residents have returned home from active duty since September 11, 2001. [This number is based on the discharge papers (DD214) and does not take into account those who may have been activated more than once.]

#### **Massachusetts Air and Army National Guard**

8,293 men and women serve in the Massachusetts National Guard.

Approximately 45 percent of Massachusetts Army National Guard members are married and/or have children.

Since September 11, 2001, more than 8,200 members have been federally activated and approximately 6,000 have served overseas.

Currently, 176 members of the Massachusetts National Guard are deployed (as of November 3, 2008).

Approximately 30% of guard members have deployed more than once. The average deployment is 12-15 months.

The Massachusetts National Guard has lost 10 service members in the GWOT.

F-15 fighters from Otis Air National Guard Base on Cape Cod were the first military forces to respond to the terrorist attacks in New York on the morning of September 11, 2001.

#### **Nationwide Statistics\***

As of October 25, 2008, there have been 4,797 military deaths in Operation Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom.

 $889\ members$  of the National Guard and Reserves have been killed in the GWOT.

Guard and Reserve Components make up approximately 52% of the U.S. population of veterans from Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom.

There are approximately 23.8 million United States veterans nationwide.

1.8 million United States veterans are women. Approximately 20% of the current active duty population is women.

The United States has almost 1.5 million military servicemembers on active duty in its current fighting force.

More than 38,000 American military servicemembers have been killed or wounded in the Global War on Terrorism.

# Legislature Extends the Pay Differential Law until 2011 for National Guard and Reserve in '09

**Budget** 

Both the Senate and House Budgets included language in the Fiscal Year '09 budget that would extend a law that allows the Commonwealth to make up any salary difference for state employees who are members of the National Guard or Reserve and are called up for active duty military service. It also extends the local option for cities and towns to adopt these benefits for municipal employees, including employees of a school district. The pay differential law had been set to expire on September 11, 2008.

#### **New Mobile Vet Center Program in Springfield**

Massachusetts has been selected to be the recipient of one of the first fifty new VA mobile counseling centers. The VA states that these vans will "improve access to counseling by bringing services closer to veterans...These vehicles will be used to provide outreach and direct readjustment counseling at activeduty, reserve and National Guard activities, including postdeployment health reassessments for returning combat service members...The 38-foot motor coaches, which have spaces for confidential counseling, will carry Vet Center counselors and outreach workers to events and activities to reach veterans in broad geographic areas. Each vehicle will be assigned to one of VA's existing Vet Centers, enabling the center to improve access to counseling by bringing services closer to veterans."

## HIGHLIGHTS OF LEGISLATION PASSED FAVORABLY BY THE VETERANS & FEDERAL **AFFAIRS COMMITTEE**

H. 4526, Providing for an Investigation and Study by a Special Commission Relative to the Hidden Wounds of War on Massachusetts Service Members (Representative Verga) – Please see page 1 for more information about this legislation addressing the special mental health needs of veterans returning from combat. The bill (originally H. 3728 and renumbered H. 4312) was signed into law on April 10, 2008 and is now Chapter 1 of the Resolves of 2008.

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#### **Veterans Committee Chairs Call for Help from Commonwealth Scrap Metal Dealers to Deter Veterans Grave Robbers**

Just weeks before Veterans Day, thieves stole more than 250 veterans medallions and flag holders from the Riverside Cemetery in Saugus, Massachusetts. This is one of several such incidents that have occurred over the past year in the Commonwealth. As the economy remains uncertain, cemeteries across the nation are taking precautions to protect veterans markers, which can be sold to scrap metal dealers for what has become an increasing profit.

Both Chairmen are asking that Massachusetts scrap metal dealers raise their awareness in light of this recent theft. With the scrap metal dealers and cemeteries working in conjunction, there is hope that the monetary value of the markers will be voided by eliminating the market for them. The Chairs would like to see a program that calls for identification of individuals who takes copper, brass or any type of high value metal to a scrap yard, similar to the regulations that exist for pawn shops. Senate Bill 2371, which was passed favorably in 2007 by the Consumer and Professional Licensure Committee, would require such identification. Recently, there have been numerous reports of stolen metal from constructions sites, including the Longfellow Bridge

Current Massachusetts law makes the willful destruction of a veterans grave marker or metal plaque, veteran's flag holder or flag, punishable by imprisonment in the state prison for no more than five years or by imprisonment for no more than two-and-ahalf years in conjunction with a fine of no more than five thousand dollars. However, the removal of flags and memorial tokens without proof of their destruction is only considered a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine of no more than one thousand dollars or by imprisonment for no more than six

# **Legislature Honors Active Duty Servicemembers** and Families of the Commonwealth

A Blue Star Service Flag, which military families are authorized to hang in honor of an active duty military family member, now hangs in Memorial Hall of the State House in recognition of the sons and daughters of the Commonwealth who are currently serving. Memorial Hall is a sacred site in the Massachusetts State House, dedicated to honoring veterans, current servicemembers and the proud military history of the Commonwealth. On April 22, 2008, legislators held a solemn ceremony, which was attended by Governor Patrick, to dedicate and install the Blue Star Service Flag and to acknowledge the sacrifices of the men and women from Massachusetts

#### **HISTORY- 9343 LOSE LIVES IN 53 MINUTES IN WW II**

On January 30th, 1945 Gotenhafen time; 7:08pm Moscow time; 2:08pm Milwaukee, WI, USA time), the Soviet sub S-13, commanded by Alexander Marinesko, hit the Gustloff with a spread of three torpedoes. The Gustloff immediately leaned to starboard, righted itself, and then leaned to again. She then launched rescue flares and broadcast an SOS. According to an eye-witness account of Oberbootsmannsmatt Karl Hoffman, the first torpedo struck the Gustloff at the bow, directly below the helm deep below the waterline. The second torpedo exploded under the area of the ship that was the swimming pool, and the third torpedo hit amidship in the forward part of the engine room, ripping the ship hull and shattering the machinery. Soon, the forecastle was nearly underwater, with the stern beginning to rise above the waterline. In under 50 minutes time, the Gustloff was gone, taken beneath the icy black waters of the Baltic, and with her, 9.343 men, women and children, Amazingly, 1.239 people were saved by the heroic and selfless work of a number of German ships in the area. Torpedoboot T-36 rescued 564 people, Torpedoboot Löwe 472 people, Minensuchboot M387 98 people, Minensuchboot M375 43 people, Minensuchboot M341 37 people, steamer Gottingen saved 28 people, Torpedofangboot TF19 saved 7, freighter Gotland 2 people, and Vorpostenboot 1703 saved one person, a 1 year-old child.
